### Fiction Book Discussion

*The Photograph*  
by Penelope Lively

Lunch will be served

It opens with a snapshot: a young woman, Kath, at an unknown gathering, hands clasped with a man not her husband, their backs to the camera. Its envelope is marked DO NOT OPEN—DESTROY. But Kath's husband, Glyn, does not heed the warning. The mystery of the photograph, and of Kath herself and her recent death, propels him on a journey of discovery that sends shock waves through the lives of her family and friends. The elfin Kath—with her mesmerizing looks and casual ways—moves like an insistent ghost through the thoughts and memories of everyone who knew her: self-centered Glyn, past his lusty, passionate professorial prime; her remorselessly competent sister Elaine, a doyenne garden designer married to feckless ne'er-do-well Nick; and their daughter Polly, beloved of Kath, who oscillates between home and family and the tumultuous new era she inhabits. Lively's signature mastery of narrative and psychology, explores issues that extend far beyond its London suburban setting: a woman's beauty and its collision with her own happiness, sisters' rivalry and lovers' cooling, a marriage in supreme crisis, and the cost of professional "success" as life unfolds. This book explores retrieval of memory and the catastrophic effect that past events can have on the present.

Olivia Hunt is unemployed, living alone, and working on the fourth draft of her suicide note when she gets a phone call that lets her know what real trouble is. Madeleine Hunt is her younger sister, the annoyingly happy one who married the hometown guy while Olivia set out to conquer Hollywood. And Maddie is in trouble. Pulled home for the first time in years, Olivia gets a painful dose of real life as she tries to help her sister, keep her parents from running off the rails, and reconnect with the boyfriend who left without a word but might still be the love of her life. And, of course, the movie she's been trying to put in front of cameras for years heats up just as she leaves town. Racing between Hollywood, hospital rooms, and film sets in Spain, Olivia has to do the impossible at work and at home—and learns that love will let her do no less. By turns charming, heartrending, and hilarious, *The True and Outstanding Adventures of the Hunt Sisters* is a novel for anyone who has ever loved a sister (or a great story).

Tired of getting lost on the Internet, or of spending hours online and not really knowing what to do? Then this computer class may be just right for you.

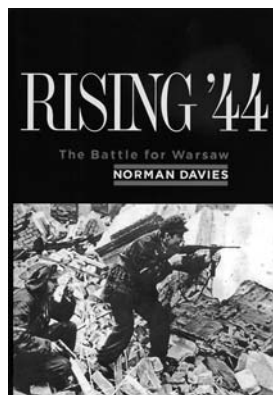

## Nonfiction Book Discussion

*Rising '44  
the Battle for Warsaw*  
by Norman Davies 2004,  
784 pages

Thursday, March 31, 7:00 p.m.

In August 1944, Warsaw presented the last major obstacle to the Red Army's triumphant march from Moscow to Berlin. When the Wehrmacht was pushed back to the Vistula River, the Polish Resistance poured forty thousand fighters into the streets to drive out the hated Germans. But Stalin halted the Russian offensive allowing the Wehrmacht to regroup and destroy the city. For sixty-three days Soviet troops and other Allied forces watched from the sidelines as tens of thousands of Poles were slaughtered and Warsaw was reduced to rubble. *Rising '44* is brilliant narrative of one of the most dramatic episodes in twentieth-century history. Although this tome may appear daunting, Davies' writing style is truly engaging. Even if you don't manage to finish, please join us to discuss what you think!

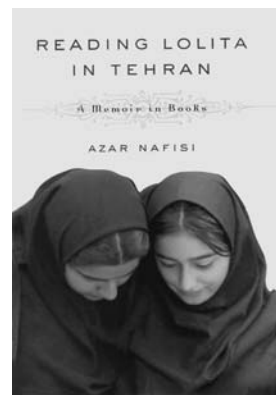


## Nonfiction Book Discussion

*Reading Lolita in Tehran*  
by Azar Nafisi 2003, 347 pages

Nafisi captures the struggle of Iranian women for mental and moral survival in this ghastly wasteland. For the small circle of selected female students with whom, from 1995 to 1997, she met each Thursday in her home, where she lived with her architect husband and two children, literature – the works of Nabokov and Fitzgerald, Henry James and Jane Austen - formed a kind of secret garden into which they escaped beyond the mullahs' control. In fiction the students were free to meditate upon their individuality and their womanhood.

### “The Station Agent”

A strong ensemble and director Tom McCarthy's sweetly low-key observations make Sundance favorite *The Station Agent* a treat. The film revolves around a reserved somber dwarf (Peter Dinklage, immortalized by his brilliant tirade in *Living in Oblivion*), a train enthusiast who inherits a small depot in rural New Jersey. He makes friends somewhat reluctantly with a group of eccentric locals: the guy at the coffee stand, an artist (Patricia Clarkson, impeccable as usual), and a librarian (Michelle Williams). Although a few of the plot strands feel forced, when the actors are simply playing off each other using McCarthy's nicely understated dialogue, which is most of the time, the film ambles along winningly. The key is Dinklage's smoldering performance, one of those reminders that a single scowl is worth pages of conversation.

In this elegantly polished comedic melodrama directed by Patrice Leconte, a mysterious stranger, Milan (played by French rock icon Johnny Hallyday) is the lone passenger disembarking from a train in a sleepy French village. There, he meets Manesquier (Jean Rochefort), an elegant, retired schoolteacher of French poetry who is as chatty and friendly as Milan is taciturn and reserved. The older man offers his new acquaintance a room in his large mansion, and the two cautiously get to know one another. Even though they appear on the surface to be complete opposites, Milan and Manesquier find that they have many things in common. Their guarded relationship slowly turns into one of mutual respect. Both men are approaching their twilight years. Manesquier fantasizes about robbing a bank, while Milan looks around at the comforts of his host's house and wonders what it would be like to enjoy a life of ease. As the two men talk about their lives, admiring and envying each other's lifestyle, a subtle osmosis occurs, in that these two men, who might have had no tolerance for each other decades earlier, can now make a space in their lives for the other.

## AUTHOR OF THE MONTH

### March: Lois Lowry

As the child of a military officer, Lowry grew up living all around the world. She married young, and is the mother of four children, although one of her sons was killed serving the United States Air Force. Lowry's books have varied in style and content, yet all are connected by emphasizing the importance of human connections.

### April: Beverly Cleary

Beverly's love of books started when she was just a young girl and her mom acted as librarian for the small Oregon town she lived in. The "library" was set in a lodge room upstairs from a bank because the town had no library! Beverly was classified as a not so good reader in school, so she struggled to conquer reading and did succeed by spending most of her time reading. As she grew older the librarian in her new town had convinced her that she should write stories for boys and girls. Beverly followed that good advice as a young woman, and now a librarian herself, began to write books. Beverly Cleary's books have earned her many prestigious awards, have appeared in over twenty countries, and have now been adapted for PBS and network television.

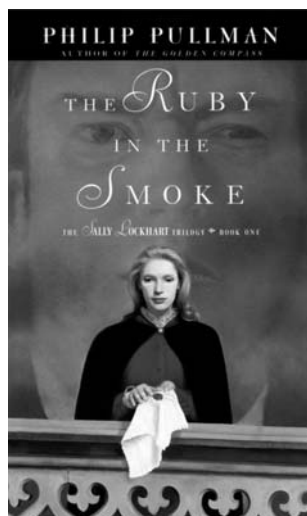
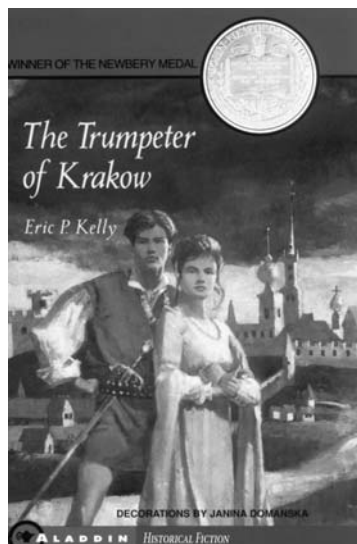

A Polish family in the Middle Ages guards a great secret treasure and a boy’s memory of an earlier trumpeter makes it possible for him to see his father.



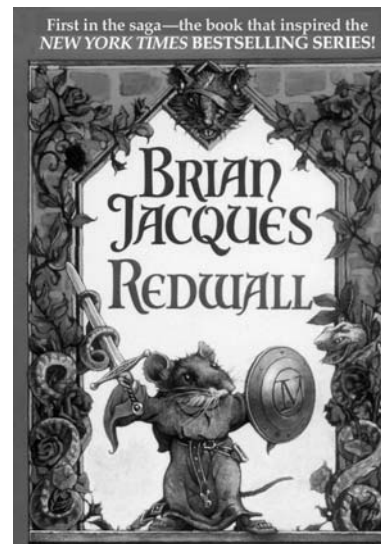
### *The Ruby in the Smoke (Sally Lockhart Trilogy, Book 1),*

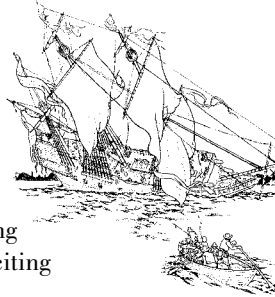
