*SuffolkWave Digital Media to Your Home
Computer from the Library Webpage*



The Quogue Library is pleased to announce a new service, *SuffolkWave*, which cardholders can use to download a variety of digital media to their home computers.

A cooperative project involving Suffolk County public libraries, the Suffolk Cooperative Library System, and Overdrive Inc., *SuffolkWave* is accessed from the library's webpage at www.quoguelibrary.org and allows library patrons to download audio books, music, and video to their home computers, which then may be transferred to many popular portable devices. Patrons will need a valid library card, broadband access to the Internet, and a home computer to access *SuffolkWave* materials. A one-time free download of OverDrive Media Console is required to use the downloaded files. This service is intended for home use and is not available on library computers. **Need more help? Ray Lawrence's "Lantana" takes its name from an Australian plant whose delicate exterior leaves and flowers conceal a dense thicket of sharp branches. That the bush is a symbol of the tangled relationships the movie explores -- marriage, chance acquaintanceship, the prickly bond between therapist and patient -- is clear enough, and the movie, accordingly, finds traps and snares beneath the most benign and ordinary interactions.



Bullets Over Broadway

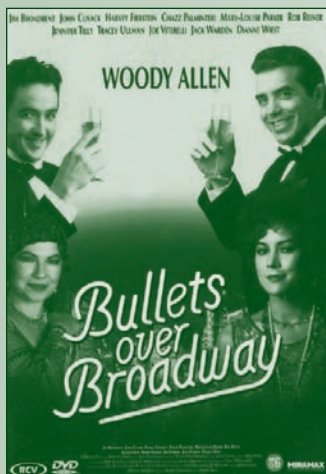

Bullets Over Broadway is a 1994 film written by Woody Allen and Douglas McGrath and directed by Woody Allen.

In 1928, David Shayne (John Cusack) is an idealistic young playwright newly arrived on Broadway. In order to gain financing for his play, *God of Our Fathers*, he agrees to hire Olive Neal (Jennifer Tilly), the actress/girlfriend of a gangster. She is demanding and talentless, but her gangster escort Cheech (Chazz Palminteri) turns out to be a genius, who constantly comes up with excellent ideas for revising the play. As the players prepare for opening night, Shayne is soon in over his head claiming Cheech's rewrites as his own, cheating on his partner Ellen (Mary-Louise Parker) with the show's seductive, alcoholic leading lady Helen Sinclair (Dianne Wiest), and facing his leading man, a compulsive eater (Jim Broadbent), beginning an affair with Olive.

The film was nominated for seven Academy Awards including Allen and co-writer Douglas McGrath for original screenplay, Allen for director and Tilly and Palminteri for Supporting Actress and Actor respectively. Wiest won an Academy Award for Best Supporting Actress for her performance.

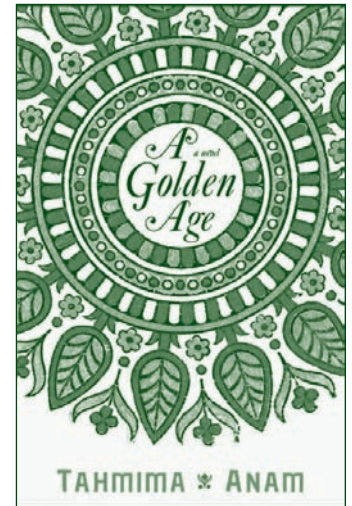

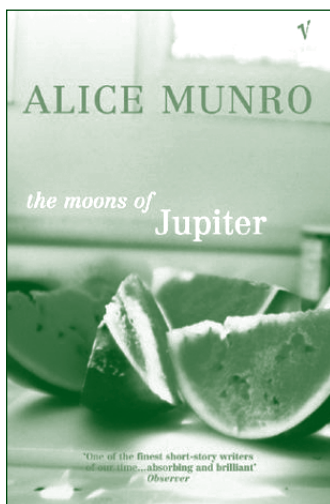

A Golden Age: A Novel
 by Tahmima Anam

The experiences of a woman drawn into the 1971 Bangladesh war for independence illuminate the conflict's wider resonances in Anam's impressive debut, the first installment in a proposed trilogy. Rehana Haque is a widow and university student in Dhaka with two children, 17-year-old daughter Maya and 19-year-old son Soheil. As she follows the daily patterns of domesticity – cooking, visiting the cemetery, marking religious holidays—she is only dimly aware of the growing political unrest until Pakistani tanks arrive and the fighting begins. Suddenly, Rehana's family is in peril and her children become involved in the rebellion. The elegantly understated restraint with which Anam recounts ensuing events gives credibility to Rehana's evolution from a devoted mother to a woman who allows her son's guerrilla comrades to bury guns in her backyard and who shelters a Bengali army major after he is wounded. The reader takes the emotional journey from atmospheric scenes of the marketplace to the mayhem of invasion, the ruin of the city, evidence of the rape and torture of Hindus and Bengali nationalists, and the stench and squalor of a refugee camp. Rehana's metamorphosis encapsulates her country's tragedy and makes for an immersive, wrenching narrative.

The Moons of Jupiter

by Alice Munro

Themes of heartbreak and the sadness of women aging dominate this collection: in “The Stone in the Field,” maiden aunts inhabit a farmhouse, dreading human contact; in “The Turkey Season,” a girl paid to gut turkeys observes the sexual carryings-on of adults. The writer's questioning memory gives us sharp flashes of reality that are so vividly recalled they permit us to live another life for a moment. Munro is in a class of her own....No other writer working today is able to invest the humble story with more power, grace or breadth....Munro has been compared to Chekhov...She has the haunting lyricism and the indulgent wisdom to qualify.

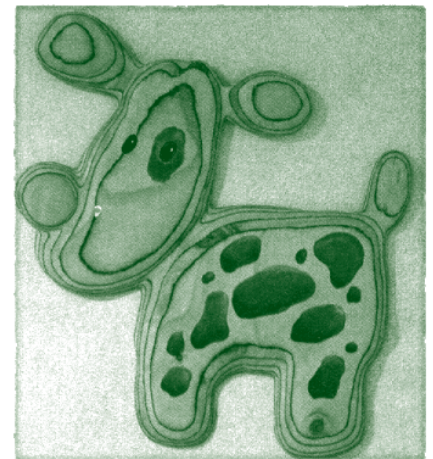

MARCH – “GONE TO THE DOGS” ART BY GINGER ANDERSON

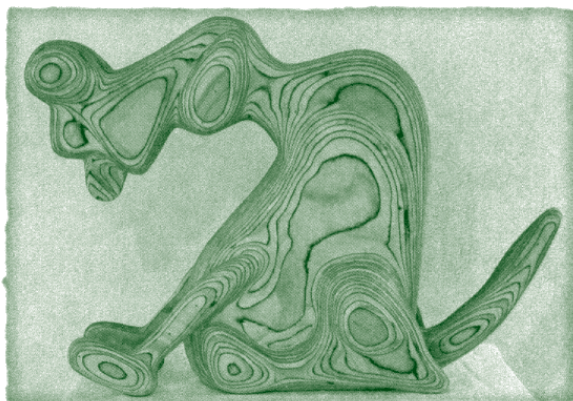
Multi-media show by Ginger Anderson, Quogue School Coordinator of Enrichment.

Exhibit by two photographic artists, widely recognized for their individual creative interpretations of East End waterways.

Robert Lefferts – creates “MotionScapes,” impressionistic images

Bob Duryea – separates the abstract from reality

Artists’ Reception, Saturday, April 5 from 3:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Robert Lefferts, former teacher and marketing executive, created MotionScapes, a form of impressionistic photography based on intentionally blurred landscape and seascape images. They stress the beauty of light, color and shape rather than the details of the scene. The result is achieved by combining camera movement with composition that focuses on color, light and perspective.

Robert states, “My images convey a sense of nature’s splendor and serenity. And because of their blurry ambiguity, I hope they help viewers to attach their own meaning to the images and thus, realize their own artistic imagination.”

Robert began his professional photography in 2003, after a career teaching at Stony Brook University; as president of his own marketing firm; and as an executive and management consultant. He came to understand the amazing impact of graphic images on both emotion and cognition, and this led to his authoring two books “Elements to Graphics” (Harper and Row) and “Charts and Graphics for Effective Presentation.” (Barnes and Noble)

He has had six solo shows in the past three years and been in more than 30 group shows. His work is in private collections, and it has been widely exhibited on Long Island, including the deCordova Gallery in Greenport, Spinnato Gallery, VJS Gallery and Ashawagh Hall in East Hampton. A winter resident of the Virgin Islands, his work is at the Gallery St. Thomas and the Artist Association Gallery on St. John. His work has also been printed in a variety of media, such as CD covers, brochures and design books.

Robert resides in East Setauket with his wife Sybil, whom he credits for his inspiration.

William M. Duryea, Jr., known as Bobby, is an award winning photographer who brings out the abstract from the reality in his photographs of the ocean, bays and water streams of Long Island. Having sailed and fished all of his life, his subjects range from the serenity of sea birds to the drama of ocean waves. He uses a Hasselblad and a digital Canon camera to achieve the poetic, often spiritual effect he envisions.

He believes that “pictures can be seen anywhere if the artist will forget he or she is looking at the familiar. There is a lot of searching for the strange and unusual and not enough analysis of things familiar.”

Bobby’s work is included in the permanent collection of the Museum of the City of New York, the Library of Congress and in several private collections. A graduate of the School of Visual Arts in New York City with a BFA in photography, he was awarded the Rhodes Medal. He has had numerous one-man shows, as well as group shows, including the East End Arts Council, the Remsenburg Academy and the National Arts Club in New York. Articles on his work have appeared in several Long Island publications such as “Visual Opinion,” the East End Magazine “Blue Sand” and the *Southampton Press*.

A native Long Islander, he was born in Old Westbury and summered in East Hampton. He resides in Manhattan and Remsenburg with his wife Lovejoy, an accomplished artist.

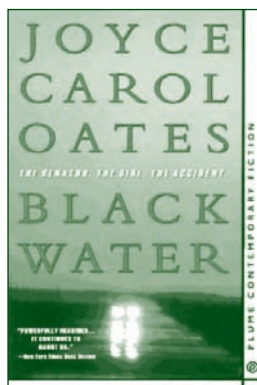
Angus, Thongs and Full-Frontal Snogging,
