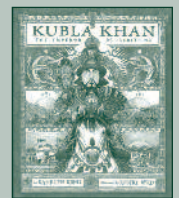

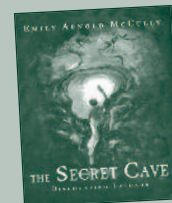
**The Rooster Prince of Breslov**, by Ann Redisch Stampler. Traditional Jewish tale about the teachers who lead us to wisdom.

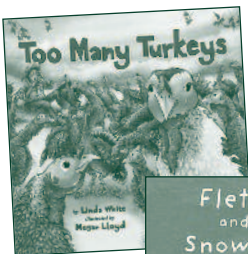

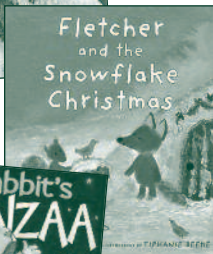

**NOVEMBER - THE NATURAL WORLD - Vibrant paintings of our natural surroundings by artist/author Elizabeth P. McMahon.**

A life-long resident of Long Island, Elizabeth McMahon finds inspiration in her natural surroundings. Whether hidden in coves, glistening bays, meandering creeks or wild surf, her work captures the feeling of both shores. Her creative interests include birds, sea life and wild animals. Her passion for the natural world has led her to teach for forty years at the American Museum of Natural History and to have discussions and critiques with world renowned Canadian artist and environmentalist Robert Bateman. Her work has appeared in several juried shows and galleries including the Hoorn-Ashby Gallery in New York, the Barnes Gallery in Garden City and numerous venues on Long Island.

With a degree in Art History, Elizabeth has spent many years in the commercial world and published five children's books. After studying oil painting with Frank Mason at the Art Students League, she began painting full time and now paints in watercolor, acrylic and gouache as well as oil. She resides in Plandome and Quogue with her husband Frederic.

## **ALEXANDRA KELLER WISNOSKI**

Alexandra Wisnoski grew up in Westhampton, studied art at the University of Miami, Florida, and in 2008 she graduated from the College of Charleston, South Carolina, with a degree in French and minors in Art and Philosophy. She currently lives in Paris, France, where she was recently awarded a master's degree in Cultural Translations from the American University of Paris. Alexandra has traveled around the world and believes that, "Travel is the chance to reunite the pieces of self that have been scattered across the earth through the many lifetimes of energy manifestation."

Ms. Wisnoski's oil and acrylic paintings are both abstract, vivid and thought provoking.

Alexandra says that she has been an artist for as long as she's lived. She believes that everyone is an artist, a creator, an orchestrator of their own reality – the painter merely exhibits this; she mirrors it. "I am merely an instrument through which the life force moves. My art work is about evolution and flow from one moment to the next. The hand creates as the mind, quixotic in nature, negotiates and categorizes, defining 'concrete' shapes and shades."

## **MIA WISNOSKI**

Color, design, images, art and history have always encompassed a large part of Mia's life. Throughout her career as an educator, they continued to play a role. She earned a B.A. in History and Speech/Theater Arts and an M.A. in History. Her interest in fine art photography began about 25 years ago. She has studied at the International Center for Photography, Parson's School of Design and New School University.

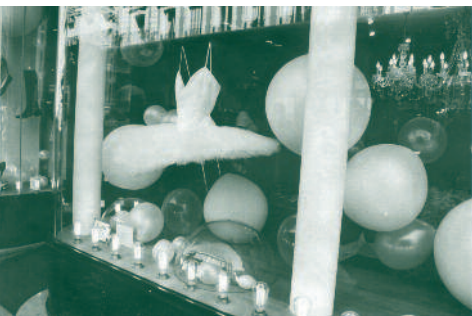
Landscape photography is Mia's specialty. Inspired by the beautiful beach community of Westhampton in which she lives, Mia spends much of her time on the east end of Long Island and traveling throughout the world capturing images; always searching for that quintessential moment. Her photographs are comprised of film, both black & white and color, and hand painted and infrared images. Mia's images evoke a sense of nostalgia, serenity and carefree moments of days gone by.

"My inspiration evolves naturally from my surroundings. The beauty and discord found in the simplicity of every day life creates a palette from which I create my images. A single moment captured, frozen in time stirs my innate process."

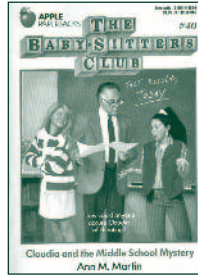

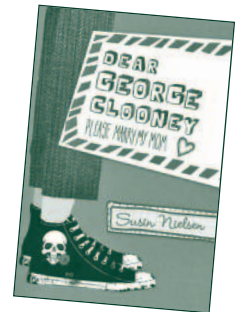

**The Last Station – 2009**

This film focuses on the last few months of the novelist and writer Leo Tolstoy's family and social life. It stars Christopher Plummer as Tolstoy, Helen Mirren as his wife Sophya, James McAvoy as Tolstoy's new personal secretary Valentin, Kerry Condon as Valentin's charming and aggressive love interest, and Paul Giamatti as the leader of a group of "Tolstoyans" who wish to widely promote Tolstoy's ideals.

The film is set in early 20th century Russia, before the harsh realities of the Russian Revolution occurred in 1917 and thereafter (Tolstoy died in 1910). It was a time in history when Socialism was still an untried idealized conceptual form of government, and Tolstoy in his final years became more "radical" in his political, religious, and social philosophies.

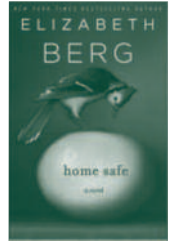
